I am greatly looking forward to serving over the next three years, and have already welcomed new members to our VMSG Committee following a call for nominees last November. These new members bring fresh ideas and dynamism to the work of the Committee, and are already actively working on behalf of our Group. We have the forthcoming 2016 VMSG conference planning progressing well thanks to our colleagues in Trinity College Dublin (TCD), and our Committee members are looking into new avenues to further develop our profile, and encourage VMSG underwritten conference sessions and field trips.

VMSG Meeting and Conference 2015

VMSG got off to an excellent start with our annual conference and meeting, this time hosted by our colleagues from UEA and held in in Norwich city centre (5th-7th January 2014). The meeting took place over three days and was set in the impressive, ornate and one-time Barclay's banking hall now run as a fashionable city centre meeting venue by the OPEN Youth Trust. The meeting attracted 202 delegates and was an impressive showcase for national and international research. More than half the delegates were students, and contributions came from researchers from Great Britain, Sweden, Ireland, Switzerland, Iceland, Chile, Denmark, France, Germany, Norway, USA, New Zealand, Belgium, Czech Republic, Italy, Japan, Russia, South Africa, Monserrat, Ethiopia, and Canada. The conference meal venue was an equally impressive venue – the 'Top of the Terrace' meeting rooms overlooking the Norwich City football pitch.

The conference comprised a total of 32 talks (11 from students) and 92 posters (c. 50 from students). The VMSG Award for 2014 was presented to Jenni Barclay (UEA), Michael

Stock (Oxford) won the Bob Hunter Prize for the Best Student Talk; and Anna Barth (Cambridge) won Geoff Brown Award the for the best student poster. Extra prizes, in the form of new publications donated by the attending Publishing Houses, were awarded by the LOC and session leaders to the best student presentation (talk or poster) in each session. Awardees included: Rebecca Astbury (Edinburgh); Tom Pering (Sheffield); Robert Jones (Leeds); Danielle Charlton (UCL); and Anna Barth (Cambridge).

VMSG offers special thanks to Anna Hicks and Jenni Barclay for leading the local organising committee (LOC) team, which included Richard Herd, Amanda Hamer, Katie Preece, Jon Stone, Roland von Glasow, David Litchfield, Charlotte Monteil and Peter Simmons all of whom contributed to ensuring we had an excellent meeting. Russell Rajendra is also thanked for all his effort in ensuring the registration and financial aspects of the meeting progressed smoothly.

VMSG Developments

We have had a substantial change in VMSG Committee membership following five individuals offering to take on the two vacant positions as ordinary members of committee; VMSG conducted hustings of its membership and Janine Kavanagh (Liverpool) and Sebastian Watt (Birmingham) were elected to serve. At the same time, Kate Dobson (Secretary; Munich University) and Mike Widdowson (Treasurer; Open University, Hull University) stepped down from their roles having both completed 5 year tenures. Kate was co-opted to remain on Committee, and Mike stepped up to take on the role of VMSG Chair; with these two 'veterans' the VMSG benefits from continuity and experience. Professor Andy Saunders (Chair; Leicester) stepped down having completed his 3 year tenure. Andy is warmly thanked for his wisdom and

contribution to VMSG over the past 3 years. He has provided careful steering of our Committee, and has worked to ensure that our SIG achieve its goals and develop over this period.

Looking to the future, and strengthening links between SIGs, we are discussing the possibility of a joint workshop at the next meeting (Dublin, 2016) in collaboration with MDSG, and have started discussion regarding a more formal link between the annual VMSG meeting and that of TSG.

VMSG Finance

The finances of the group continue to remain strong. Recent outgoing monies include £200 for student prizes (best talks and posters) from the Norwich meeting; £1600 agreed for 8 student travel bursaries. We expect a number of applications for student support for forthcoming meetings (i.e., EGU, and Goldschmidt) at our June Committee meeting. In addition, we have recently agreed to sponsor 'The Sorby Conference on Fluid and Melt Inclusions (ECROFI23)' in Leeds in June 2015 and The University of Edinburgh's Scottish Sensory Centre and the British Sign Language Glossary project for Geography and Earth Sciences at £500 and £300, respectively.

Prizes and Awards

A recent meeting of at the Meeting of Council of the Mineralogical Society included the Chairs of Special Interest Groups (SIGs), which includes VMSG. Council asked the SIGs to promote applications for their prestigious awards. There are several awards/medal nominations on offer. One is the newly instigated 'Howie Award' for the best student paper deriving from a PhD project (which last year went to a volcanology student who had been a previous VMSG prize winner). Another is the Max Hey medal for excellence in research contributions from younger researchers within 15 years of their first degree. Finally, there is the hugely prestigious Schlumberger Award for scientific excellence in mineralogy and its applications (in the very broadest sense). This is for established researchers who have contributed significantly to their field. Looking at the previous recipients' list, there are at least four igneous petrologists/volcanologists who have been awarded this medal. As SIG chair I've been asked if the VMSG would like to

nominate an individual from our ranks. The nomination will stay 'on the table' for three years. The deadlines for the medals are the end April, but we can always nominate for next year's round. If you have a suggestion, please alert the VMSG Committee through the Secretary, and we will aim to support suitable nominations.

- Environmental and climatic effects of volcanism

Fieldwork at Popocatépetl and Colima volcanoes, Mexico

We recently secured a NERC grant dedicated to a detailed study of one of the most active volcanoes of the world, Popocatépetl (Mexico). The focus of the project is to explore the dynamics of magma mixing and its influence on Popo's eruptive activity through crystal residence times and crystalscale isotope studies. In order to collect samples for the project, we went to Mexico in January, taking off from London on 18/01 and pitching camp in the small town of Amecameca, at the foot of Popo. From there, guided by the collaborating Popo-expert Hugo Delgado-Granados from UNAM (Mexico City), we went up the volcano's flanks every day and collected almost 200 kg of rock samples from all major units of the last 23 ka. Back in the Museum, the lava and pumice samples collected will be analysed very carefully, in order to find out more about the timescales of eruptions at Popo, and the control of magma mixing on eruptive styles.

After two weeks of fieldwork at Popo, Chiara and Martin went to Colima volcano, where they prospected for possibilities of research collaborations on the highly active volcano. They also captured spectacular pictures of the erupting volcano during a flight around the summit and fieldwork at its flanks.
